Helping Save Animals World Wide

Elmbrook Humane Society is able to help nearly 2,000 animals every year, but did you know that we are making an impact saving lives around the world? So, how could a small humane society located in Brookfield, Wisconsin do that?

For many years, we have been helping save the lives of dogs from Saint Croix by working with their local humane society and local citizens who vacation there and are willing to transport them back with them. In 2017, we were able to help 12 dogs from Saint Croix.

In early Summer 2017, we were contacted by the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) to see if we would be able to take in a few dogs that would be coming to the United States from South Korea where Humane Society International would be shutting down a dog meat farm. We committed to saving the lives and the task of rehabilitating four of these dogs.



In July, we welcomed Potolet and Winnie, both Tosas and just under 6 months of age, Rocky, a mixed breed just a little over a year old, and Marcus, a Jindo just under two. All four dogs needed medical care and are still learning how to adjust to life outside of a small kennel where they were seen and treated like a crop. It has been great seeing them learn what being a dog is really like!

Then after Hurricane Maria arrived and devastated Puerto Rico we once again worked with HSUS and HAWS and we were able to save the lives of 12 dogs from Puerto Rico. The dogs that we were able to help were already being housed at shelters and rescues in Puerto Rico. After Hurricane Maria, HSUS was working with citizens to assist those in need of temporary or emergency housing for their pets, and the best way we could help was to transport some of the dogs that were already up for adoption to us which made room for all of the animals that were displaced during the hurricane and waiting to be reunited with their families.

EBHS is proud to be able to assist so many dogs both locally and around the world find loving homes right here in Wisconsin. What a huge impact our small shelter is making in saving lives!



Your gifts help homeless animals

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A Note from our Executive Director

"There is a coyote hanging around in my neighborhood."

"I found a nest of bunnies in my yard/garden/flower bed."

We hear the above and many more wildlife concerns throughout the year. We are here to help with any wildlife questions that you have though we do want to encourage you to remember that ultimately the goal is to live harmoniously with wild animals as they were here long before us and the great outdoors is their home.

What can you do to achieve happily co-existing with wild animals? Here are a few tips:

1. Prevention. While many people enjoy having the company of birds at their feeder or an occasional deer grazing in the yard, they often do not want a family of raccoons nesting under their porch or the sound of a mysterious creature running in the walls of their home. Taking steps to prevent problems from the start is usually the easiest solution.

a. Do not provide a food source. Most animals hang around homes because there is something tasty for them to be around for. Bird feeders, unsecure garbage cans, dog food containers, and even a tasty vegetable garden can all be open invitations to wildlife.

b. "Wildlife-Proof" the home. Patch holes, block any possible entry way (including the chimney), and put up a fence around the garden.

This should only be done once it is determined there are no mothers and/or their young so they do not become trapped inside.

2. Education. Some of the most frequent calls received regarding wildlife involve "orphaned" young. Often these animals are not orphaned at all and removing them can greatly reduce their chance of survival. Taking the time to research some common habits of native wildlife in the area can provide essential information regarding many wildlife concerns.

3. Removal. At times when wildlife gets a little too close, removing them becomes necessary. Ammonia soaked rags placed at the entry and exit points of a nesting site are quite effective. Playing music and turning on lights will create an uncomfortable environment for many species of wildlife and they will often leave on their own. Occasionally, after all efforts have been exhausted physical removal may be necessary. Before doing this, contact us at 262-782-9261 to find out how to do so properly.

It's been a busy season for Humane Education at EBHS. This fall, we launched a program partnering with area teachers to have our humane educator come into the classroom and present an animal-centered educational lesson to the students. The program topics include responsibility of pet care, campaigns regarding various current animal welfare issues, wildlife, etc. All of the programs meet Wisconsin Academic Standards and can correlate with what teachers are already doing in their classroom with persuasive writing, graphing, how-to writing, and more. In addition, several of the classrooms have therapy dog teams that have partnered with EBHS come into the classrooms to give students the opportunity to read to a therapy dog on a regular basis. Not only do the kids (and dogs) love this, but studies have shown the benefits of having children read to an animal. We are hoping to form partnerships with additional teachers this fall.

This winter, we also launched our new Kid's Club. This is a monthly club for children ages 8-12 to come to the shelter and learn about various humane education topics in a small group. Door County Sled Dogs presented some very fun and interesting information for the children during their visit in January and most importantly brought in some amazing sled dogs for a visit. One of their sled dogs was even adopted from EBHS!

This summer, we will be holding several summer camp sessions for children at the shelter. These camp sessions will be educational and also a fun time to learn about animals and spend some time up close and caring for some animals at the shelter. Humane Officer News

What happens if my pet bites someone?


Preventing a bite from occurring in the first place is always the best option but knowing what to do if a bite occurs is also very important.

A bite from an animal can be serious business. Not only is it a scary occurrence for all involved but bites have the potential to cause significant damage. It is important to try to remain calm and remove your pet from the situation immediately. Confine your pet to a crate and then politely tend to the person who was bitten.

A bite that breaks skin (even a tooth scratch that causes an abrasion) should immediately be washed with soap and water. It is also a good idea to seek medical attention immediately. Make sure to exchange contact information with the bite victim and report the bite to the County Humane Officer.

Your pet will need to be quarantined for 10 days following the bite for rabies

per Wisconsin State Law. The quarantine may be done at home if the pet is current on vaccinations. Follow up contact with the bite victim is often much appreciated.



It is incredibly important to take necessary precautions to prevent further bites from occurring and working with a professional trainer is encouraged. Preventing a bite is the best way to keep you, your pet, and the community safe.


Emma (formally Star)

Dogs are great at being dogs. They jump, dig, and bark! If we want them to live in our world, we must train them. If you do not invest the time in training your dog how to live in our world, they will become "self employed" security in your home, redecorators of your home, and yard and/or gardeners who dig. It doesn't have to take a lot of time. By incorporating training into everyday life, you can have the well trained dog you have always dreamed up! The Right Start program will show you how! Get all the tools you need to have a well-trained companion in just three weeks in this small class designed to focus on training basics, manners, impulse control, and meeting the needs of your companion. With only three dogs in each class, there will be plenty of time for questions and one on one attention. You will learn about management (crate training, mental stimulation, and preventing behavior problems), training/manners (sit, wait, leave it, drop it, and come), and focus and impulse control. This is a great class for dog's ages 6 months and up. This is a short but intense training program designed to make for happy adopters and happy, well behaved companions!

Behavior Blogging


As much as we love our canine companions, often there are behaviors that we don't love about them. It might be barking, digging, or jumping up on guests. These are all normal dog behaviors, they are appropriate behaviors in their world, but very unacceptable in ours. We often hear my dog is "bad," "doesn't listen", or "is afraid of ____" (fill in the blank).

A dog that jumps on guests can be taught to sit for attention. Dogs only listen to what they are taught and English is not their first language so just because we say "sit", it doesn't mean our dog knows what that means. We can teach dogs to listen once we learn how to communicate and motivate them. Dogs are just like humans in that they repeat behaviors that are rewarding for them. Even the dog that is fearful can gain confidence and learn through training and behavior modification.

When people ask us if we think behavior can be changed, our answer is, of course! Have you ever tried

to change your behavior or start a new habit? It can be done but can take time and consistency! The good news is it's never too late. You can sign up for a training class or private lesson at EBHS so you can learn how to communicate and train your dog. Not only will you enjoy spending time with your companion more via training, but it is also a great bonding experience. Start today and be on your way to changing behaviors and to a better relationship with your 4 legged companion.

And don't forget about your cat! The Trainable Cat by John Bradshaw/ Sarah Ellis is a great read and YES cats can be trained too!
