A Note from our Executive Director

I think it is safe to say that 2020 presented unimaginable challenges to just about everyone on this planet! With any challenge, if commitment, collaboration, respect, and ingenuity are embraced by all, there can be positives and even good changes as a result.

Like most businesses, we at Elmbrook Humane Society (EBHS), were initially forced into abruptly doing business differently from how we once knew it. With uncertainty early on, for the first time in our history, we moved every single animal in our care into a foster home. Our shelter was empty, eerily quiet, and that in and of itself took some time to process. But, we quickly decided to look at this from a perspective of what can we do to make EBHS better given we have an empty building for a short period of time. Our animal care staff switched gears and provided EBHS tons of TLC. Most of our facility was repainted, personal touches being placed throughout. An incredibly thorough disinfection of our entire building took place from wiping walls, to moving cat housing units to clean every nook and cranny, to reorganizing supply areas, and more! Weeks passed and it became evident that we were faced with a new way of doing business so we looked at all of our programming and made necessary adjustments to continue to provide the best possible service to everyone needing us. Virtual adoption counseling, dog training, and humane education began and now has really become quite normal for all. We worked together to adjust in

person programming, especially for our youth, so children could take part in person while providing a safe environment leaning heavily on national health organizations for guidance.

We are proud to say we continue to care for and provide services to animals and people alike, delivering ongoing and new programs and services to ensure animals have a safe place and that people have the tools and resources to properly care for their pets.

We are proud to be able to continue and expand our humane education programming to children and adults helping to grow a more humane community.

We are proud to say that we developed new, creative, safe ways to keep our adoption program not only functioning, but prospering.

We are proud and thankful for our volunteers who are in a position to help with daily needs at our facility and open their homes to fostering animals to give back to the community through our organization.

We are proud to be able to stay in touch with our community that we care so deeply about and a community that cares about EBHS the same.

On behalf of the animals, our Board of Directors, staff, and volunteers, thank you for continuing to believe in us and for your support! We hope that 2021 is off to a good start for you and hope it brings you much happiness, good health, and time with your loved ones!

Humane Education Highlights

At Elmbrook Humane Society, we continue to make youth programming a priority through our many enriching Humane Education programs for our community. This past fall, we launched our Kindness Council, a youth governance program for young animal advocates who have completed at least one Kindness Camp and want to get more involved in helping EBHS. The Council was formed to help youth explore ways to help animals in need and to learn how to put ideas into action to make a difference.

Students meet twice a month. A portion of the meeting focuses on leadership development activities and teambuilding. Recent topics included "Leadership Qualities of Youth" and "How to Share Your Ideas and Listen to Others." The second half of the meeting is run by the students who follow an agenda, keep time, and discuss topics as a group.

To ensure that all ideas are heard, the students created a "Group Code and Ground Rules" poster that includes guidelines like "Respect Others' Ideas" and "Be Honest."

Students are currently hard at work creating raffle baskets for our Paws for a Cause event in April, and planning future fundraising and awareness projects for EBHS.

Wisconsin winters can be tough on our four-legged companions. Exposure to the cold, dry weather can result in itchy, flaking skin, cracked paws and

increased joint discomfort. So how can you help your furry family members stay safe this winter? Below are our top 3 pet safety tips during the cold weather:

» Dress your pets appropriately when going outside. While some pets are conditioned to the subzero temperatures, other will require a coat, sweater, or booties. After each trip outdoors, be sure to wash and dry your pet's feet and body to remove any ice, salt, or chemicals.

» Alert visiting family and friends about the pets in the house. Make sure they understand to keep doors closed, food away from countertop edges, and make them aware of any other rules you have set inside your home regarding the animals.

Qualities of youth

» Create a warm, cozy place in your home for your companion to sleep that is off the floor and away from all drafts. A dog or cat bed with a blanket would work great.

Keep in mind that if it's too cold for you, it's probably too cold for your pet. If left outdoors for too long, animals can freeze, become disoriented, lost, stolen, injured or killed. It can also be dangerous to leave pets alone in a car during cold weather because cars can act as refrigerators that hold in the cold
